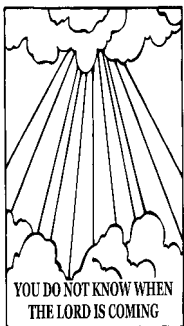

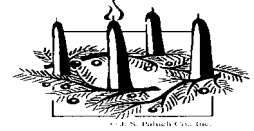

In our culture, the observance of Christmas begins in mid-October or even earlier, as stores put out their holiday displays. But the calendar Catholics live and celebrate by is different from the secular world's. When we let our faith and the ancient wisdom and tradition of the Church center us as we plan, schedule, and organize our time, we're celebrating Christmas as Catholics.



### **ADVENT**

As Catholics, we prepare for Christmas by celebrating the season of Advent in the four weeks preceding Christmas. We hear John the Baptist, echoing the words of the prophets of Israel, call us to prepare the way for the coming of the Lord in our own lives now, and to look for the fulfillment of his kingdom in the future.

**Did you know?** We celebrate two feasts of Mary during Advent. On the **Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception** (December 8), we celebrate the truth that Mary was conceived without sin. (This feast does not celebrate the conception of Jesus, as many mistakenly believe.) On the **Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe** (December 12), we celebrate Mary's appearance to the poor Indian peasant St. Juan Diego in Mexico in 1531.

**The O Antiphons:** As Christmas draws near, the Church traditionally prays these verses highlighting the ways Jesus fulfills Old Testament prophecy. We begin December 17 with "O Wisdom on High" and end December 23 with "O Emmanuel." The full texts of these verses can be found in any missalette. You might pray them before a meal or in the evening, perhaps around the Advent wreath in the eight days leading up to Christmas.

*From Children's Mouths—*

A mother was preparing pancakes for her sons, Kevin, 5 and Ryan, 3. The boys began to argue over who would get the first pancake. Their mother saw the opportunity for a moral lesson. If Jesus were sitting her, He would say, "Let my brother have the first pancake. I can wait." Kevin turned to his younger brother and said, "Ryan, you be Jesus!"

**STEWARDSHIP—Giving money to the church is a symbolic act—the offering of ourselves in service and devotion to God. Giving is a practical matter, too, because the offering makes it possible for the church to pay its bills and carry out its mission in Christ's name. How much should I give? The Bible says that we should set aside our "first fruits"—that our offering to God should be the first portion we set aside, not what remains. Some people give by proportion, for example \$2 or \$3 per week for every \$1000 of annual income. Others set aside a percentage of their income. The Old Testament guideline for giving was the tithe (usually 1/10). How close do you come to the giving expected of the early Christians?**
